Another area we are keen to develop still further is our wonderful outdoor environment. With the Forest School lessons continuing in our woodland area, where the children learn how to whittle sticks, follow trails and practise their culinary skills in the mud kitchen, they will get the chance to be outside more whatever the weather. Also we are looking forward to installing an all-weather track around the field which will enable the children to have a dry walk or jog as we take part in the increasingly popular 'Daily Mile'.

Our dedicated PTFA will be redesigning the children's garden ready for their Dig for Victory project, and I'm sure the children will enjoy the lottery that is vegetable growing as they learn about germinating, weeding and, hopefully, harvesting. Our outdoor classroom has received a sprucing up, and the plans for improving the front of the school continue, giving the children every opportunity to continue their learning outside.
